Curriculum Overview for Year 3

As <u>writers</u>, the children will be writing a historical narrative based on the text Stone Age Boy by Satoshi Kitamura. The children will also write a instructions based on the text How to Wash a Woolly Mammoth by Marcia Williams.

English



As <u>readers</u>, the children will read a variety of texts and genres based on our Topic the Savage
Stone Age. The children will take part in class guided reading sessions where they will learn a new comprehension skill and apply this in their group reading with an adult.

As <u>artists</u>, the children will explore Stone Age cave paintings and recreate their own based on the Cuevas De Las Manos (Cave of the Hands) paintings found in Argentina.

PSHE

As <u>individuals</u>, the children will develop their understanding of what challenges people might face and how people can overcome obstacles to achieve their dreams and goals. We will be focusing on motivation, determination and perseverance.

ICT

As <u>technologists</u>, the children will develop their understanding of E-safety and will discover how to use a range of input and output devices efficiently.



As mathematicians, the chicken will develop their understanding of measurement, including length, mass, capacity and time. They will also develop their understanding of place value and fractions.

Mathematics

The children will develop their understanding by using concrete apparatus, formal written methods and a variety of mathematical investigations.

Throughout the year, the children will continue to improve their understanding of the times tables up to 12x12. A times tables test will be conducted on Thursday mornings.

As <u>linguists</u>, the children will be learning how to describe and ask for food in a restaurant. The children will also begin to understand the difference between masculine and feminine. The children will learn through a variety of games, songs and stories.

Geography

As geographers, the children will be able to name and locate different areas found within Great Britain and Europe where significant prehistoric sites have been found.

Science

As <u>scientists</u>, the children will be learning about rocks and soil. They will then move onto learning about forces and magnets later in the term.

The children will develop their understanding through a range of exciting practical experiments and investigations.

As <u>historians</u>, the children will learn about the chronology of the Stone Age, including the three main periods. They will discover how people lived, hunted and


